



## No 6 With everything? by Yokel

The letters which appear in the yellow squares can be used to make the name of an actor connected with the central solution and one other but not in the same versions. All the answers relate to Rattigan's non-stage work. Though not all are complete titles each answer appears in one title. Titles are used once only. One four letter word used in the first two clues is a noun referring to the same meaning of one sense of a homograph word used in the title.
